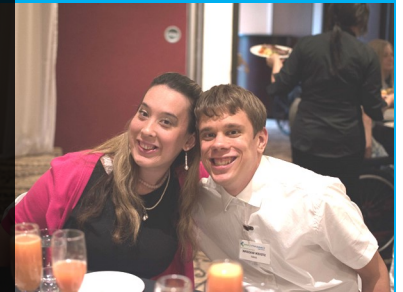

Terry Lake will continue his passionate work in the Board as our Past President.

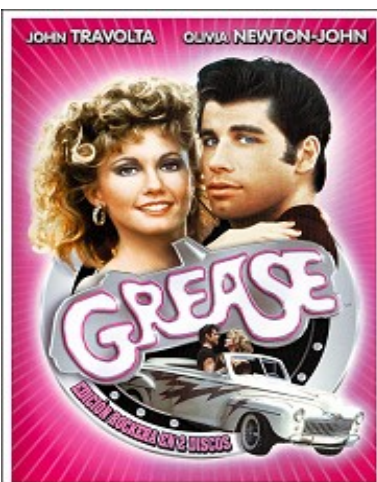

After lunch everyone enjoyed watching the movie Grease!

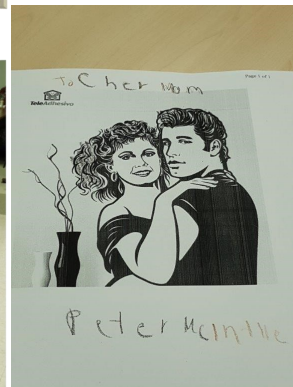

The goal of the conference was to focus on a holistic approach to self-care.

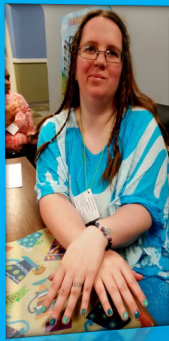
The conference took place on June 2nd. Sixty-nine people registered to participate, including people supported by agencies in Kitchener, Waterloo, Guelph, and Elmira.

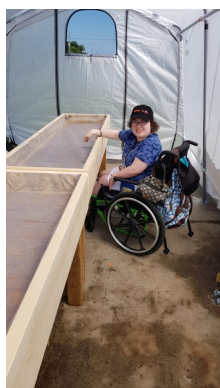

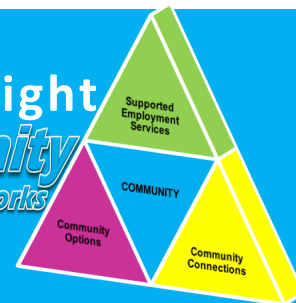

LEGAL UPDATE



Upcoming Changes to ODSP!

Ontario residents with disabilities can expect to see major changes to the Regulations ^[1] under the *Ontario Disability Support Program Act* ^[2] (the "Regulations") in the months to come. These changes – outlined in prospective amendments to the Regulations and the government's proposals in the 2018 Ontario Budget (the "Budget") – represent substantial improvements to welfare in the province.

Asset Exclusions

Currently, under the Regulations, the prescribed asset limit for a single ODSP recipient is \$40,000. ^[3] Many people with disabilities struggle to qualify or maintain eligibility for ODSP due to this restriction. Although the Regulations contain exemptions for certain classes of assets, they do not go far enough to ensure that people with disabilities can maintain a reasonable standard of living without having to sacrifice assets intended to support them well into the future.

Under prospective amendments to the Regulations, effective September 1, 2018, funds held in a Registered Retirement Saving Plan ("RRSP") or Tax-Free Savings Account ("TFSA") will no longer be included in the calculation of assets. This means that funds in an RRSP or TFSA will no longer result in the person's automatic disqualification for income support. It should be noted that, given that RRSPs and TFSAs contain internal limits on the amounts that can be contributed per year, i.e., the "contribution room," ODSP recipients will not be able to shelter an indeterminate amount of assets within these accounts.

The Budget proposes a complete elimination of cash and other liquid asset limits, to be effective at some point during the 2019-20 fiscal year. However, we will await the new government's response to this proposal.

Income Exclusions

Effective November 1, 2018, the Regulations are amended to exclude from the calculation of income any payment from a trust or life insurance policy, gifts or other voluntary payments to an ODSP applicant or recipient. Currently, such payments – unless used for a specified purpose, such as to contribute to an RRSP – are excluded from income only up to a maximum of \$10,000 for any 12-month period. This restriction has had the effect of discouraging families and friends from making gifts to their loved ones on ODSP out of fear that they might jeopardize their eligibility status. The restriction has also placed undue limitations on the amounts that trustees could disperse to beneficiaries of Henson Trusts.

Once the amendments come into effect, ODSP recipients will be able to receive payments from gifts, trusts and life insurance proceeds in any amount. The time has come for Ontarians with disabilities to have the option to use their trust funds for paying the cost of decent rental accommodations or other housing costs, purchase healthy food, take a vacation, and/or otherwise live with dignity and enjoy a reasonable quality of life.

Increase in ODSP Rates

The Budget proposes a 3% increase to the ODSP rates in each year for the next 3 years, starting in fall 2018. For single people on ODSP, this means an increase of \$35 per month in the first year, and \$107 per month after three years.

Conclusion

The implementation of the changes described above would make a world of difference to people with disabilities across the province, substantially improving their quality of life and ability for families to plan for a secure future. We wait, along with the rest of the province, to see whether these planned benefits for people with disabilities will be respected by our new government.

We will continue to provide updates as new information becomes available.
